Key West

How do I get to Key West?



By air

The easiest (and most expensive) way is to fly to the Key West airport. Service between Key West International Airport and Miami, Fort Lauderdale/Hollywood, Atlanta, Naples, Orlando, St. Petersburg, and Tampa is provided by American Eagle, Cape Air, Comair/Delta Connection, Gulfstream/Continental Connection, and US Airways/US Airways Express. Other carriers come and go depending on the season.



By rental car

Many of our passengers fly into Ft. Lauderdale and rent a car for the week. Southwest Airlines is a good choice for this option. Some folks plan on diving the Key Largo wrecks on the weekend before or after their trip on the Spree. We recommend Quiescence Diving Services www.divekeylargo.com in Key Largo, or Conch Republic Divers www.conchrepublicdivers.com on Tavernier. Tickets into Ft. Lauderdale are much less expensive and the schedule is better than into Miami or Key West. You can make some pretty good deals on car rentals also.

Where is Stock Island?

Stock Island is the next major island up the Florida Keys chain from Key West. Stock Island is about a 10-minute cab ride from the Key West Airport. The cab company's are based on Stock Island, so they know where they are going.



Why do I care?

That's where the Spree docks!



How do I get to the Spree?

By personal car

Once you're on Stock Island, you're 10 minutes away from the boat. Print the Google map from our maps page and follow the winding roads to Robbie's Marina. We have a sign out by the road showing you where to turn in, as it is a large boatyard. It really is only 3 turns off Highway 1—5th Street to 5th Avenue to Shrimp Road.

By taxi

We'll cover your taxi fare to the boat, just get a receipt from the driver. Don't let the driver escape...we take luggage early but not passengers. We'll pay your tab, then you're free to explore Key West until boarding time.

What else is there to do in Key West?

I like to people watch on **Duval Street**, where all manner of folks can be seen, and I will leave it at that.



The Mel Fisher Museum

www.melfisher.org at 200 Green Street is full of recovered sunken treasure from his finds on the Atocha and Santa Margarita.

The Hemingway Museum

www.hemingwayhome.com is located at 907 Whitehead Street, and you can scratch the head of a 6 toed cat there. The cat will like it. The gardens are amazing.

You can visit the Key West Aquarium

www.keywestaquarium.com at 1 Whitehead Street. Pet a shark at Key West's first attraction, and not from the Spree in the sanctuary. The aquarium, built in 1934, features the turtles, sharks, game and tropical fish that are native to the waters of Key West.

It's fun to go see the **Harry S. Truman White House** www.trumanlittlewhitehouse.com While president, Truman spent 175 days in Key West at Quarters A on the Truman Naval Station. Today, as Florida's only presidential museum, the Little White House provides a gander of one of America's greatest presidents.

I also like the **Shipwreck Historem** (is that a word?) **Museum** www.shipwreckhistorem.com at 201 Front Street. Step back to 1851 and discover the treacherous world of shipwrecking and how it made Key West the richest city in the United States. Live actors, artifacts, laser technology and a 60' lookout tower make the experience one of a kind!



As the day draws to a close, you must go to the sunset celebration at **Mallory Square** to watch (what else) the sun set. Street vendors perform including the French cat trainer fella, the tightrope walker juggler dude, an escape artist, a bagpiper, some banjo players, some iguana guys and a bird man.

When the cacophony reaches a crescendo, go back to Duval Street, buy a stupid t-shirt for yourself and someone you care about, and go visit the many bars I have been kicked out of. That is called the **Duval Crawl**, and everyone must experience it at least once in their life. When you have had enough to drink, mosey up to the Garden of Eden on the third floor of The Bull and Whistle bar. The Garden of Eden is clothing optional, and they have a body painter who will paint your nethers to look like you are wearing clothing, but you really aren't. **DON'T COME BACK TO THE BOAT WITH YOUR NETHERS PAINTED.** We don't want to see it. Even if we say we do, we don't. Even if we do, we don't. You can walk around Key West naked as long as your nethers are painted. We will NOT bail you out of jail.

The Key West Bed & Breakfast is located in the William Russell House (circa 1898), and is listed in the National Historic Register. Constructed by Bahamian shipbuilders, this lovely 3-story Victorian is located on a quiet, tree-shaded street in the heart of "Old Town."

Will we ever eat?

On boarding evening, you're welcome to join the crew at one of our local eateries. This is a no-host meal, but if you'd like to join us just stop by the boat and we'll let you know where we're headed. Boarding starts after we return from dinner.

Once you're on the boat we feed you non-stop, but once you're back on land you're on your own again. Eateries abound on the island. Local venues like **Thai Cuisine** on Greene St, **Finnegan's Wake Irish Pub** on Grinnell and the **Two Friends** on Front St are a few of our dinner favorites. **Willie T's** on Duval St has amazing salads, and **Blue Heaven** on Thomas St. has wonderful brunch, with kitties and chickens to keep you entertained until your table is ready. A favorite on Stock Island is **Hogfish Bar and Grill** on Front St (different Front St). If all else fails, follow your nose down Duval St—most restaurants on Duval post their menus street-side. Visit the locals instead of the big chains for some amazing meals—you won't be disappointed! And yes, there is a **Starbucks**—it's on the ground floor of the La Concha hotel, 430 Duval St.
